DOCUMENTS/CERTIFICATES REQUIRED TO BE UPLOADED

1. Matriculation certificate with date of birth.
2. 10+2-mark sheet (Internet copy not valid).
3. Passport-size photograph.
4. A character certificate in original from the head of the institution last attended in case of regular candidates and a character certificate issued by a gazetted officer or the panchayat pradhan in the case of private candidates and the candidate with a gap after 10+2. The character certificate should not be older than six months on the day of submission of the admission form.
5. Certificates issued by competent authority for availing the benefit of reservation or relaxation in age in the category concerned, i.e., SC/ST/OBC/Person with Disabilities/Economically Weaker Section/Ex-Serviceman (or EWS)/Ward of Freedom Fighter.
6. Any gap in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by documentary evidence/affidavit as proof of his/her activities during the period of the gap.
7. H.P. domicile certificate for exemption of tuition fees (for female candidates only).
8. An equivalence eligibility certificate from H.P. Board/H.P. University for the candidates who have passed 10+2 from a board other than the H.P. Board of School Education/CBSE/ICSE.
9. Migration certificates need to be submitted by candidates coming from boards/universities other than the H.P. Board of School Education/H.P. University.
10. The APAAR ID (Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry ID) to ensure the accuracy and completeness of the student's academic record.
11. An online anti-ragging affidavit with a reference number at either of the two designated websites, namely, www.antiragging.in and www.amanmovement.org.

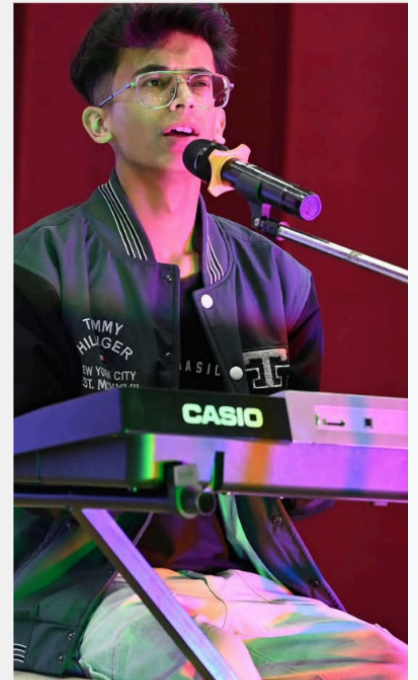

Nestled amidst the serene surroundings of Inverarm Hill, one of Shimla's historic seven hills, Rajiv Gandhi Government College, Chaura Maidan, Shimla, popularly known as Kotshera College, has been a beacon of higher education since 1984. Located just 3 km from the Old Bus Stand and easily accessible from Mall Road, Boileauganj, and Summer Hill, the campus offers both connectivity and tranquility. It lies a short walk from the 103-bus stop and Shimla Railway Station, making it highly convenient for students from across the city.

A Campus Steeped in History and Nature

Set against the backdrop of snow-capped mountains and lush forests, the college is reached via a shaded trail opposite the iconic Cecil Hotel. The campus is adorned with rare *Cryptomeria japonica* trees and surrounded by landmarks like the Academy of Indian Audit and Accounts, Yarrows, and Annadale Helipad. The institution takes its popular name 'Kotshera college' from the



historic Kotshera House, originally a colonial-era mansion linked to a family from Gujranwala (now in Pakistan). Before becoming a college, it served as the office of the Himachal Pradesh State Education Board.

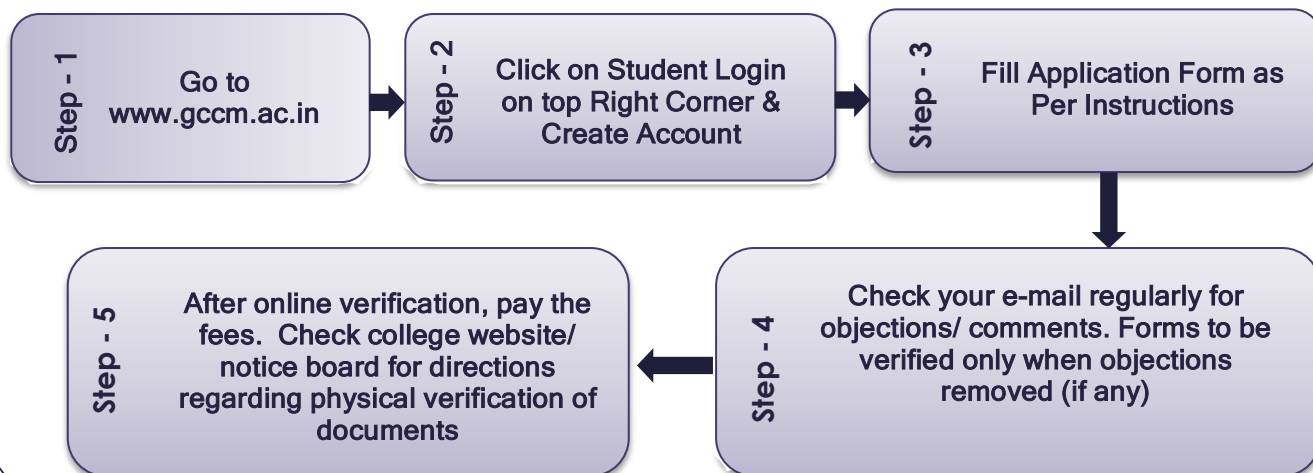

GENERAL ADMISSION RULES

Students/ Parents/ Guardians should read the instructions thoroughly before filling out the admission form for any course.

1. A candidate seeking admission to the first semester should apply online. The form, complete in all respects, must be submitted through the college website.
2. Before applying for admission, students must obtain an APAAR (Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry) ID linked to DigiLocker and also sign an online anti-ragging pledge.
3. The eligibility criteria for admission to B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. in the first semester are strictly as per the latest ordinances/guidelines/calendar notified by Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla.
4. Candidates are required to upload the original documents and a recent passport-size photograph.
5. The admission form recommended by the admission committee and approved by the principal entitles a candidate to deposit the prescribed fee within the stipulated time period.
6. Change of subject is allowed only with the permission of the principal. A change of faculty, i.e., from science to arts or vice versa, is permissible only if the candidate has the required percentage of marks as specified for admission to that faculty.
7. College authorities may discontinue a course if an adequate number of students are not available/enrolled in that particular course.
8. The roster for reservation of seats in various categories shall be as per rules of Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla.
9. All admissions will be as per the admission schedule notified by Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla from time to time.
10. In case of any clarification or guidance, the applicant must approach admission guidance committee of the college.

Steps for filling Online Admission Form



ELIGIBILITY CONDITIONS: B.A./B.SC./B.COM.

1. The applicant must have passed the +2 examination under 10+2 or an equivalent examination conducted by a Board/University established by law in India.
2. Applicants willing to take admission to B.Sc. (Physical and Life Science) must have passed the 10+2 examination in four written subjects (including English) with Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics/Biology with 45% marks. For those who opt for life sciences, biology at the 10+2 level is compulsory.
3. The student of NIOS (National Institute of Open School) who has passed all five subjects, securing the requisite marks, will be admitted.
4. Provided that a student who has passed the qualifying exam in the arts stream with a minimum of 33% marks will be given preference in the BA programme.
5. Provided that a student who has passed the qualifying exam with a minimum of 40% marks in the commerce stream will be given preference in the B.Com. programme (33% for girls). Students from other streams opting for commerce must have studied economics or mathematics at the +2 level and attained a minimum of 45% marks.
6. A student who has passed Shashtri or Prak Shashtri from Sanskrit colleges affiliated with the HPU or Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan (Deemed University) under MHRD, Govt. of India, shall be eligible for admission to the Arts stream only, provided that the candidate has passed Prak Shastri or Shastri with English as one of the subjects.
7. The upper age limit for admission to B.A./B.Com. first semester is 25 years for girls and 23 years for boys as on 1 July 2026. Age relaxation of three years is allowed in the case of SC/ST candidates. The Vice Chancellor of HP University, Shimla, has the power to permit age relaxation, for reasons to be recorded in writing, up to a maximum of six months.
8. Merit will be worked out by taking into consideration the best of five subjects, including English as one of the subjects.
9. In case of a tie in selection, the candidate older in age shall be given weightage.
10. An applicant who fails to deposit the dues by the last date and time shall forfeit his/her right to admission, and the seat shall be offered to the next applicant in the merit list.
11. All admissions will be provisional subject to the approval of Vice-Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh University, Summerhill, Shimla.
12. The university ordinance shall be strictly adhered to in admission to all the classes. All terms and conditions of the admission and fee structure can be changed or modified as per the directions of Himachal Pradesh University, Summerhill, Shimla.
13. Admission of a student is liable to be cancelled in case he/she furnishes incomplete/wrong/false information or in case of concealment of facts. Disciplinary action will also be taken against such a candidate.

ADMISSION GUIDELINES: B.C.A. & P.G.D.C.A.

Bachelor of Computer Applications

Bachelor of Computer Application (B.C.A.) is a three-year degree course based on 6 semester system of examination, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Computer Applications of Himachal Pradesh University. The admission to the course is open under two categories of seats: Subsidized and Non-Subsidized.

Eligibility Conditions

Candidates who have passed 10+2 examination (in any stream i.e. Science, Arts, Commerce, Vocational etc.) from H.P. Board/CBSE/ICSE or any other examination considered equivalent to 10+2, by the Himachal Pradesh University Shimla, with 40% marks (35% marks in case of SC/ST candidates)

OR

Any examination of a Board/University/College/School in a Foreign Country recognized as equivalent for the purpose of eligibility by the Vice-Chancellor/Equivalence committee or on the recommendation of association of Indian University, with 40% marks (35% in case of SC/ST candidates).

Selection Criteria:

- i. The admission will purely be on the basis of percentage of marks (rounded up to two decimal places) obtained in 10+2. If there is a tie then first, the percentage of marks (rounded up to two decimal places) obtained in matriculation will be considered, and second the candidates older in age will be given preference.
- ii. Separate merit list shall be prepared for subsidized and non-subsidized categories. The 40 subsidized seats will be filled first and the remaining 40 seats in non-subsidized self-financing category shall be filled after all the seats in the subsidized category are filled.
- iii. All old students after completion of 2nd & 4th Semester can seek admission in the 3rd & 5th semester respectively if they fulfil the eligibility criteria set by the university ordinance from time to time.
- iv. The admission to BCA Semester III/V will be given on roll-on basis.
- v. Other reservation rules of H. P. University shall be applicable.

Age Criteria:

Maximum age limit for admission to BCA course is 21 Years for general category, 24 Years for SC/ST Category and 23 Years for girl candidates as on 1st July, 2026. The Vice-Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh University may permit age relaxation upto a maximum of three months.

Training

One-month short term training and minor project submission will be mandatory for each student after the examination of 1 to 5 semester.

Dress Code

There is a compulsory Dress Code for all BCA students for imparting a professional outlook to the students and inculcating discipline, corporate culture and sense of decorum among them. The prescribed uniform is as follows:

Grey Coat, Grey Trousers, White Shirt, Red Tie, Crest, Grey Socks, and Black Shoes.

Note:

- i. All the students of BCA III/V Semester are directed to pay the college fee under the Roll-On system well within the prescribed schedule. No one will be permitted to attend the classes without depositing the prescribed fee. Lectures attended under Roll-On system will also be counted for every concerned purpose.
- ii. It is to be noted that all the admissions under Roll-On system are provisional. If any student fails to fulfil the eligibility criteria (as mentioned in this prospectus) his/her admission will stand cancelled automatically.
- iii. Admissions under Roll-On system are to be regularized (after fulfilling the required eligibility conditions) within 10 days of declaration of their university result, failing which their admission will automatically stand cancelled.
- iv. The present fee structure may change as per the latest University/Govt. of H.P. guidelines/notification.
- v. Changes (if any) in the guidelines and eligibility for admission will be notified as per the notification of Himachal Pradesh University Shimla.

Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications

Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications (P.G.D.C.A.) is a one-year diploma course split over two semesters, leading to the award of Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application from Himachal Pradesh University. The admission to the course is open under two categories: Subsidized and Non-Subsidized.

Eligibility Condition:

Candidates who have passed graduation in any stream from the recognized university or its equivalent with at least 50% marks (45% marks in case of SC/ST category) shall be eligible.

Age Criteria:

Maximum age limit for admission to PGDCA course is 26 Years for general category, 29 Years for SC/ST Category and 28 Years for girl candidates as on 1st July, 2026.

Selection Criteria:

The admission will be purely on the basis of percentage of marks (rounded up to two decimal places) obtained in graduation. If there is tie then first, the percentage of marks (rounded up to two decimal places) obtained in 10+2 will be considered, and if again a tie, then the older candidates will be given preference.

Note: i) Fee once deposited shall be refunded as per the AICTE norms.

ii) 75% attendance is compulsory for all.

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED AT THE TIME OF ADMISSION

1. Passport-size photographs (front-facing).
2. Self-attested copy of matriculation certificate.
3. Self-attested copy of the 10+2 pass marks sheet issued by a recognised board.
4. One copy of the H.P. Domicile certificate for girl students (for exemption of tuition fee).
5. An original character certificate from the head of the institution last attended in case of a student seeking admission to the 1st year of any course.
6. A student seeking admission from a board/university other than H.P. will have to produce his/her migration certificate in the original.
7. Gap Year Undertaking to be attached wherever applicable. Submission of false undertaking is a legal offence.
8. One copy of the SC/ST certificate from the Magistrate (Class 1) for seeking relaxation in age and benefit of reservation in the respective category.
9. One copy of the Aadhar Card (self-attested).
10. One copy of the bank passbook front page (self-attested).
11. Affidavit of Single Girl Child.
12. Affidavit / Certificate related to the economically weaker section of the society.

Note: a) *The character certificate must not have been issued more than six months prior to the date of admission.*

b) *In case of gap year(s), the character certificate of the last attended institution must be supplemented by another character certificate obtained from a Gazetted Class-1 Officer or the Pradhan of the concerned Gram Panchayat or President of the concerned Nagar Panchayat/Municipality.*

c) *The candidate having a compartment at the 10+2 level is not eligible for admission*

d) *The original certificates are mandatory at the time of physical verification*

e) *Students must furnish the information of their latest email and Aadhaar number.*

f) *The students seeking admission to the first semester/year (as per the HPU notification) will deposit their fee only after the merit list is displayed.*



PRE-ADMISSION COUNSELLING

After filling the online admission form, all candidates applying for admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com./B.C.A./P.G.D.C.A. First Semester must appear in person before the Admission Counselling Committees of the college. The committees will commence functioning from 13th June, 2026. **Students are required to bring their original certificates for verification.** Guidance regarding the admission process will be provided, and any discrepancies found in the application form will be resolved accordingly.

Roster

Our institution follows the reservation policy of the H.P. Government and H.P. University, Shimla, for admissions. The roster for the reservation of seats for various categories shall be as per the rules of Himachal Pradesh University, Summerhill, Shimla. All students applying for admission under a reserved category (SC/ST/OBC/Physically Challenged/Sports, etc.) must furnish the related certificates. It is mandatory to submit these certificates to avail of the benefits of reservation.

CREDIT FRAMEWORK FOR UG PROGRAMMES

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 represents a transformative vision for India's higher education system, focusing on the holistic development of students to meet the requirements of the 21st century. At its core, the policy aims to move away from rigid academic structures toward a flexible, student-centric model that fosters creativity, critical thinking, and social consciousness. Some key changes introduced by the NEP 2020 include the following:

- a) **Flexible Degree Duration:** Undergraduate degrees are structured as either 3-year or 4-year programmes.
- b) **Multiple Entry and Exit Options:** Students can exit at various points with appropriate certifications (certificate, diploma, or degree), allowing them to resume their studies later.
- c) **Academic Bank of Credits (ABC):** A digital platform facilitates the storage and transfer of earned credits, supporting seamless mobility between different institutions.
- d) **Multidisciplinary Approach:** Students have the opportunity to choose courses from diverse disciplines, moving beyond traditional academic silos to tailor their education to their interests.

HP-Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes

In alignment with national goals, and based on the UGC-CCFUGP notified in December 2022, the Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla (HPU) has developed a Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter HPU-UGP). The framework incorporates all essential aspects of the UGC-CCFUGP to facilitate the achievement of the policy visions stated in the NEP 2020.

UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP 3.2.3 offers various undergraduate degree programmes for students to choose from. Under the new HP-CCFUGP framework, students can choose between a 3-year degree or a 4-year degree (Honours or Honours with Research).

- i. **3-Year UG Programme:** In the 3-Year UG Programme the students shall declare their major and minor at the end of the second semester. The 3-year UG programme shall have two-degree options:
 - a. **Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary:** For a 3-year multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary UG programme, the credits for core courses will be distributed across various subjects of the disciplines (see the programme structure ahead).
 - b. **Single Major:** In a 3-year single core UG programme, a student must secure a minimum of 50 per cent credits in the major discipline.
- ii. **4-year UG Programme:** Students who passed a 3-year multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary degree can choose to continue into a fourth year to earn an honours degree, but only in a subject where he/she studied 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses during the first three years. Students who complete a 3-year undergraduate

degree with a single major subject will continue the fourth year in the same major subject. The 4-year UG programme shall have 2-degree options:

- a. **Honours:** An honours degree can be pursued only in the subject in which the student has completed a 3-year UG degree with a single major or in the subject in which the student has completed the 3-year UG degree with 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses.
- b. **Honours with Research:** A student who secures 75 per cent or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree in Honours with Research, provided the college has HPU approval to offer the programme.

The Programme Components

The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts: (a) Core Courses and (b) Common Courses, which are described below.

- 1) **Core Courses:** These courses are designed to provide in-depth knowledge and specialisation in a student's chosen field of study. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4.
 - a) **Discipline-Specific Course (DSC) / Major Courses:** These are the primary subjects of focus that allow for rigorous, in-depth study. For a UG degree in a single major, at least 50% of total credits shall be in that major subject (64 credits for a 3-year degree and 84 for a 4-year degree).
 - b) **Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE):** These are advanced courses within the major subject that offer further specialisation. A 3-year single major programme includes 5 DSE courses.
 - c) **Minor Stream Courses (MC):** These courses are offered by a department to students majoring in other disciplines. They aim to provide a broader understanding and perspective beyond the primary major. A student must earn at least 24 credits in their minor over three years.
- 2) **Common Courses:** These courses are mandatory for all 3-year or 4-year undergraduate students, regardless of their major. Together, they account for 36 credits and are divided over 5 subdivisions.
 - a) **Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC):** These are introductory courses from broad disciplines other than the student's major or minor. Students take 9 credits of MDC and are encouraged to choose a different subject each semester.
 - b) **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):** Focused on language and communication skills, these 8-credit courses include English, Hindi, and Sanskrit.
 - c) **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** These 9-credit courses focus on practical and vocational skill-building. Two of these (SEC-I and SEC-II) must be related to the student's core or minor disciplines.
 - d) **Value-Addition Courses (VAC):** These 6-credit courses focus on ethics and human values. Examples include Universal Human Values, which fosters self-awareness, and Understanding India, which covers constitutional obligations and national development goals.

- e) **Internship/Apprenticeship/Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C):** This 4-credit component provides experiential learning by placing students in actual work situations, laboratories or community service projects. These courses are common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations.

Duration for Award of UG Certificate, UG Diploma and Degree

Under the Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) Curriculum and Credit Framework, undergraduate programmes are designed with a flexible duration of 3 or 4 years, allowing for multiple exit options with specific certifications based on the credits earned. The duration and requirements for each award are as follows:

- 1) **UG Certificate:** Awarded after 1 year (2 semesters) of study upon securing 44 credits. This must include 4 credits from an internship, apprenticeship, project, or community outreach (I/A/P/C) or work-based vocational courses completed during winter or summer terms.
- 2) **UG Diploma:** Awarded after 2 years (4 semesters) of study upon securing 86 credits.
- 3) **3-Year Bachelor's Degree:** Awarded after 3 years (6 semesters) of study upon successful completion of 128 credits.
- 4) **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours):** Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) of study upon securing 168 credits.
- 5) **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research):** Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) upon securing 168 credits. This track requires a research project or dissertation (12 credits) completed under the guidance of an eligible faculty member.

- Note:**
- a) *While students can take breaks during their studies, the total time to complete any programme cannot exceed 7 years.*
 - b) *Students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.*
 - c) *Any certificate, diploma, or degree is only awarded if the student has successfully passed all the required courses up to that point.*
 - d) *A student who exits after 3 years with a bachelor's degree cannot re-enter the programme for a fourth year later.*

Programme Structure

- 1) **Semester:** A semester comprises 90 working days, and the academic calendar is divided into two semesters.
- 2) **Credit Hours:** According to the Himachal Pradesh Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes, credits are defined as the unit by which coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum of 15 weeks). The system uses the following criteria for measuring credit hours:
 - a) **Credit Hour Definition:** A credit determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over a semester of at least 15 weeks.

- b) **Lecture Courses:** For one-hour lectures per week, each hour is counted as one credit. In a 15-week semester, a three-credit lecture course equals 45 teaching hours.
- c) **Tutorials:** One credit for tutorial work represents one hour of engagement per week.
- d) **Practicum/Laboratory/Field Work:** One credit in these areas requires two hours of engagement per week. This also applies to seminars, internships, and community engagement.
- e) **Experiential Learning:** For activities like industrial or field visits, one credit equals three hours of engagement per week.
- f) **Combined Credits:** A single course can combine different credit types. For example, a 4-credit course might consist of three 1-hour lectures (3 credits) and one 2-hour practicum (1 credit) per week.

A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits.

Semester-Wise Programme Components

During the first and second semesters, students will choose 3 discipline-specific (one stream) core courses (A, B, and C). Students opting for the stream-based multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary UG programme will have to declare one of the three subjects as a minor at the end of the second semester. The other two subjects will remain their core (major) subjects. All students will study the DSE of core courses, excluding the minor. Students opting for a single core discipline (major) have to select a major and minor out of the 3 subjects studied in the first and second semesters at the end of the second semester. Additionally, student will also take courses of their interest from the multidisciplinary, ability enhancement, skill enhancement, and value-addition categories. Students will also be placed in an internship/apprenticeship/field project or community engagement and service programme as well as participate in field-based learning/minor projects.

Note: *Students studying a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary 3-year degree are strongly advised to choose one subject for all the DSEs in which they wish to do honours or honours with research in the fourth year, as they must study at least 5 DSEs of that discipline in the second and third years.*



Certificate Courses

The SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) platform of government of India, offers a wide range of online courses, including those for which students can obtain certificates after completing a proctored exam. To access these courses and potential certifications, students are advised to register on the SWAYAM website with their APAAR (Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry) ID. APAAR ID provides a digital identity for students in the education ecosystem. Besides this, various departments of the institution are also offering different certificate courses to the students. The interested students are directed to contact the concerned head of the department(s) for admission in the certificate courses.

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) as notified by the UGC. All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university. As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

Multiple Exits and Entries

The NEP 2020 offers students multiple entry and exit options in undergraduate programme, providing flexibility to accommodate various learning paces and life circumstances. As permitted under the UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

Entry Points: Students can enter the undergraduate programme at the beginning of any academic year.

Exit Points and Corresponding Qualifications:

- 1) After 1 year: Undergraduate Certificate
- 2) After 2 years: Undergraduate Diploma
- 3) After 3 years: Bachelor's Degree or Bachelor's Degree with Single Major
- 4) After 4 years: Bachelor's Degree with Honours or Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research

Re-entry: Students who exit at any point have the option to re-enter the course within three years; however, they must complete their degree within a maximum of seven years from the original date of admission. The NAD Cell of HPU will evaluate the multiple entry and exit points to determine the eligibility of students who desire to join the University from other HEIs with lateral entry.

EXAMINATION AND GRADING

The examination and grading modalities of the HPU Undergraduate Programme (HPU-UGP) will be governed by the Himachal Pradesh University's official Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications. The assessment and evaluation system is structured according to the credit value of each course. The 4-credit courses, including Discipline Specific Core (DSC), Discipline Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor Courses (MC), along with 3-credit courses such as Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and 2-credit courses like Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Value Added Courses (VAC), and Add-on Courses (AOC), are evaluated through a two-part system. These two components are:

- a) **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** The CCA component assesses students throughout the semester through class tests, assignments, presentations, attendance, and other academic activities.

- b) **End Semester Examination (ESE):** The End Semester Examination evaluates students' understanding and performance at the conclusion of the semester through a formal written examination.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE AND GUIDELINES**(For B.A./B.Com./B.Sc. II & III Year)**

- Admission to these classes is done on a roll-on basis. Under this system the students studying in I and II Year are allowed to take provisional admission in the next class without waiting for the final result of the previous class.
 - These students will have to fill out the online admission form and deposit the prescribed fee by the stipulated date and time.
 - Admission schedules, as and when notified by H.P. University, will be displayed on the notice board and also on the official website of the college.
 - The students seeking admission in II Year will have to study eight courses in total (except students of English Honours, who will study 10 courses). They will opt for the Skill Enhancement Course (SEC-1 and SEC-2) in the subject/discipline of their first choice (DSC-1). In addition to DSC-1, DSC-2, Compulsory English, Compulsory Hindi courses in BA/ B. Com. and DSC-1, DSC-2, and DSC-3 courses in B.Sc.
 - The student of BA/B.Com. III Year will have to study eight courses in total. They will opt for a Generic Elective Course (GE-1 and GE-2) in an unrelated subject/discipline, in addition to DSE-1, DSE-2 and SEC courses. The student of B.Sc. III Year will study DSE-1, DSE-2, DSC-3 and SEC courses. - A student who fails to fill out the online admission form and deposit the prescribed fee within the stipulated period under the Roll-on system will not be allowed to attend the classes and appear in the Annual Examination.
 - A student declared Fail in the HP University Examination will have to revert back to the previous class in which he/she was declared failed by the university even if he has applied for the re-evaluation.

REFUSAL OF ADMISSION

1. A candidate expelled by any college/University or found involved in any indiscipline activities in the preceding year(s) will not be admitted in the college.
2. Any candidate who has not appeared/passed in English as a subject at 10+2 level shall not be eligible for admission in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. First Semester.
3. If the student gets admission by furnishing incorrect information or by concealing the facts, his/her admission will be cancelled on detection of such fault by the college/University.
4. In spite of the eligibility for admission, the Principal can refuse admission if the conduct of the student has not been up to the mark during previous years.
5. The Principal reserves the right to reject or cancel the admission of any student without assigning any reason or explanation if situation warrants so.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rules Regarding the Payment of Fee

1. Fees should be paid (without fine) on the dates fixed by the office for each class and notified from time to time. Delay in payment will be fined accordingly. The students who do not pay their dues by the notified dates will be charged Rs.10 per day as a late fee.
2. As per Govt. notification No EDN H(8)3(7)1/76 dated 29-06-2007 all Bonafide Himachali girls are exempted from tuition fees. At the time of admission, they will compulsorily have to submit a certificate of permanent residence issued by a Competent Revenue Officer.
3. Students with special needs with more than 40 per cent disability will be exempted from the fee and funds, subject to the production of a disability certificate issued by a competent medical authority at the time of admission (Letter No. EDN-H(8)B(15)-HPU-15/2013 dated 01-02-2020).
4. The university examination fee will be charged at the time of filling examination form.
5. Fee and funds are subject to revision from time to time by the Govt. of HP/HPU Shimla. As such, fees and funds applicable at the time of admission/subsequently will be charged.

Leave Rules for Students

1. Students applying for leave should get the recommendation from the teachers of all the classes/subjects in which they are enrolled for the sanction of leave.
2. A student can proceed on leave with prior permission from all the class/subject teachers and the committee formed for the purpose, but the application should be signed by their parent or guardian.
3. Leave for two days can be sanctioned by the Leave Sanctioning Committee. However, leave for 3 days or more shall be sanctioned by the Principal. Leave applications must be submitted in the office.
4. Leave on account of illness for more than 3 days must be accompanied by a medical certificate/hospital registration slip.
5. Students who participate in various inter-college games or other competitions will have to get their leave sanctioned & noted by the concerned subject teachers before their departure for participation. No exemption/leave will be granted during House Examination.

Fines, Penalties and Re-Admission Rules

1. In case students do not deposit their dues on the dates notified, their names will be struck off from the college roll at the end of that month.
2. The names of the students who are absent for ten days continuously from any class without proper leave shall be struck off from the college rolls. However, the principal, at

his/her discretion, may readmit such students on payment of their readmission fee along with a fine.

3. A parent/guardian must accompany the student seeking re-admission and will assume responsibility for the students' regularity in classes in the remaining period of the session.
4. Any student whose name is struck off for the second time will not be eligible for re-admission except in exceptional circumstances.
5. First re-admission will be allowed within 7 days after the name is struck off on paying a fee of Rs.100/-and fee of Rs.200/- will be charged for the second re-admission (in exceptional circumstances) within 7 days after the name is struck off.
6. Every student will have to procure a No-Dues Certificate from the college/library/ concerned department/N.S.S./sports/ fee clerk, etc., if they want to leave the college.
7. The security deposit will lapse if a student does not apply for a refund of the security within one year of his/her leaving the college.

Migration Rules

1. No migration certificate can be issued unless the student is registered with the university. A migrating student will not be admitted to the college if the subjects/courses studied by him/her previously are not available or not in a combination decided by the college.
2. Students must follow the instructions in the Himachal Pradesh University circular (No. 7-25/2018/HPU/RME dated 14-09-2020) for the online Inter-College Migration process.
3. The migrating student must submit the following documents/information:
 - i. Migration Certificate by the Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla
 - ii. Character certificate from the principal of the college last attended.
 - iii. Lecture Attendance Statement (of all subjects offered)
3. After migration has been sanctioned and notified by the H.P. University, the student must join the second college within the time period stipulated by the university
4. The admission of a student migrating from another university shall be treated as provisional and shall be confirmed when he/she produces the migration certificate issued by the university and a certificate of good conduct issued by the head of the institution last attended.
5. A student disqualified by another university shall not be given admission during the period of disqualification.

LIBRARY

The college provides library and reading room facilities to all its students. The college has a fully computerized library, with internet facility. It has a fairly good collection of books and has different sections for text book and reference books. The library subscribes to 13 daily newspapers, 14 magazines and 3 journals. Students are encouraged to avail themselves of library facilities during college hours on all working days. Our library is fully automated with SOUL software and RFID technology, and offers extensive digital resources through NLIST by INFLIBNET, providing access to over thousands of e-journals and e-books.

Library Rules

- a. Library-cum-identity cards will be issued by the librarian at the time of admission.
- b. Ordinarily, 2 books are issued at a time for 14 days, but the librarian has the right to recall the books at any time.
- c. Reference books are not issued. However they may be read and consulted in the library.
- d. The student is responsible for the book as soon as it is issued. In case a book is defaced/damaged in any way, the book is to be replaced by him/her.
- e. Loss of books should immediately be reported to the librarian in writing. In case of loss of a book, the student will have to replace the book or pay a fine in addition to the present price of the book with the permission of the principal.
- f. Library is a sacred place. The college expects its students to observe silence and necessary discipline while they are in the library.

Identity Card

1. It is mandatory for every student to carry their college identity card within the college premises.
2. A student without an identity card is deemed an outsider. In the event of an inspection of an identity card during a surprise check or for any other reason, if the student is found without an identity card, he/she will be handed over to the police or as the situation may demand.
3. The students are not permitted to replace their photographs on the identity cards due to any reason whatsoever.
4. It is the personal responsibility of the student to keep their identity card in safe custody. In case it is lost or gets misplaced, one has to file an FIR in order to get a duplicate identity card issued.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND FEE CONCESSIONS

A number of scholarships and concessions are available to eligible and deserving students. Information regarding the dates, eligibility conditions and procedure for applying for these scholarships/ concessions, etc. is notified on the college Notice Board from time to time. Eligible students belonging to SC/ST, OBC, IRDP, EBC, Meritorious and Minority Communities are benefitted by various State Sponsored and Centre Sponsored Scholarship Schemes implemented by the Government. Detailed information regarding all the State and Centre Sponsored Scholarship Schemes is available under National Scholarship Portal <https://scholarships.gov.in>. The eligible students have to produce their income certificate at the time of applying for the scholarship for first time. (Notification No. EDN-H (10) B 2005-06 misc-dated 30 Jan. 2006).

Institutional Dress Code for the Students

During the academic year 2025-26, the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) distributed complimentary institutional hoodies to all the students of B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. This initiative was designed to boost a sense of institutional belonging, unity and a shared identity among the students. To build upon this positive initiative, starting in the 2026-27 academic session, all students are strictly required to wear these designated hoodies on Tuesdays, Fridays and during any official functions of the college. This policy ensures a unified student presence while promoting institutional pride and maintaining a professional environment on campus.

Note: From academic session 2026-27 onwards the students of BA/BSc/BCom First Semester are required to purchase the hoodies at their own.

CLUBS AND SOCIETIES

NSS: The National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of the college actively contributes to social welfare and community development while promoting the spirit of national integration under the able guidance of experienced faculty members. Presently the college has two NSS Units comprising 100 students each. In each unit 33% seats are reserved for girls. Students who complete 240 hours of social service and attend a 7-day special camp are eligible for various academic and professional benefits.

NCC: Rajiv Gandhi Government College, Chaura Maidan, Shimla, has one unit of the National Cadet Corps (NCC) that operates under the 7 HP (I) Coy NCC, Shimla. The unit offers both Senior Division (SD) and Senior Wing (SW) training, with a focus on discipline, adventure, and community service. There are 75 seats available for both boys and girls. Students obtaining a 'C' Certificate in NCC are directly called for the SSB interview (without a written test) and are also given a weightage of 2% marks while seeking admission to HP University courses.

Rovers & Rangers: The college has well-organised units of Rovers (for boys) and Rangers (for girls), which provide students with opportunities to enhance their personalities and develop leadership qualities under the guidance of experienced teachers. Rovers and Rangers (the youth wing of the Bharat Scouts and Guides) is a worldwide voluntary movement that promotes discipline, service, self-reliance, and community engagement. The unit consists of two wings - Rovers and Rangers - with a total strength of 30 seats, including 18 seats for Rovers and 12 seats for Rangers.

Red Ribbon Club: The Red Ribbon Club of the college, is a student-led organization focused on raising awareness about HIV/AIDS and promoting healthy lifestyles among youth. Red Ribbon Club is a movement initiated by the Government of India to educate youth and other members of the community about sexuality, HIV/AIDS, and responsible behaviour.

Eco Club: The Eco Club of the college is a student-led initiative focused on promoting environmental awareness and action. It aims to educate students about environmental issues, encourage sustainable practices, and engage the campus community in environment protection activities. The eco club organizes activities like tree planting, waste reduction campaigns, and awareness campaigns to raise public awareness.

Road Safety Club: Road Safety Club of our college is a student led initiative focused on reducing accidents through education, awareness campaigns and advocacy for better traffic habits.

Literary Society: This society aims to inculcate among students a flair for the language and enhance their literary skills and to induce reading habits in students. It also aims to encourage the students to become orators and display their intellectual, independent thinking skills and imbibe a sense of confidence.

Electoral Literacy Club: This club has been formed to create awareness among students & new voters about the electoral process.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND STUDENT FACILITIES

Quality educational infrastructure and student facilities form the backbone of a successful learning environment. They directly impact academic performance, motivation, and holistic development by providing safe, comfortable, and resource-rich spaces.

Sports facilities

The college offers various indoor and outdoor sports facilities to prepare the students for participation in inter-college and inter-university sports championships. Some of the sports facilities are:

- i. **Multipurpose Indoor Court:** The multipurpose indoor facility is utilized for a variety of sports including badminton, kabaddi, kho-kho, judo, wrestling, wushu, and taekwondo etc.
- ii. **Multipurpose Outdoor Playground:** The college is one of the few in the state with a multipurpose playground that accommodates various outdoor games such as basketball and volleyball etc.
- iii. **Gymnasium:** The college features a well-equipped gymnasium to support physical fitness and conditioning.

Information And Technology Laboratory (IT Lab)

The college has two computer labs and a well-equipped IT laboratory that provide students from all streams with reliable access to modern computing resources and internet facilities. The laboratories are equipped with more than 90 desktop systems with updated operating systems, essential educational and productivity software, and specialized applications required by various departments.

In addition, the college library is equipped with a digital library with 10 desktop computers and 20 tablets to facilitate access to e-resources and digital learning materials. All classrooms are equipped with modern infrastructure, including high-speed wired and Wi-Fi internet connectivity, enabling effective online research, e-learning, and academic engagement.



CSCA, PTA AND ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The College Students Central Association (CSCA), Parent Teacher Association (PTA), and Alumni Association are the three primary pillars of student welfare and institutional growth. Together, these bodies help bridge the gap between students, parents, administration, and former graduates to enhance campus development and academics.

College Students Central Association (CSCA)

The primary representative body for students, managed according to Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) guidelines. It acts as a vital link between students and the college administration, providing a platform to voice concerns and develop leadership skills. It is a nominated body based on academic merit rather than direct elections. The main office bearers comprising the central executive committee of the CSCA are:

The broader CSCA body comprise of students nominated on the basis of academic excellence and active participation in extracurricular activities. It includes Class Representatives (CRs), NSS & NCC Representatives and Club & Society Representatives.

Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

The Parent-Teacher Association is formed with an objective of promoting parents' participation in different development activities of the college. There is a General Body of PTA comprising of (a) Parents or Guardians (only in blood relation); (b) Teachers; and (c) The Principal of the College, who is the Patron of the body. A college Parent Teacher Association (PTA) acts as a collaborative bridge between faculty and families to improve student success. By facilitating transparent communication and managing funds, the PTA supports academic programmes, funds essential campus amenities, and advocates for a highly enriching and supportive educational environment.

Alumni Association

The ex-students of the college under the aegis of the 'Kotshera Alumni Association' through their ideas and experiences can contribute constructively to the growth and development of their alma mater. The association provides valuable advice to the college authorities on academic and co-curricular activities and other pressing issues. The executive body consists of the following members.

CELLS AND COMMITTEES

To ensure smooth administration and holistic development, our college have established specialized committees and cells, each tasked with defined roles. These bodies collaboratively manage compliance, student welfare, academic quality, and extracurricular initiatives. The detailed information and functions for key committees are outlined below

Career Counselling and Placement Cell

The Career Counselling and Placement Cell are a vital resource centre that helps students explore and achieve their career goals. It acts as a bridge between the student and the job market, providing services like career counselling, workshops, and placement assistance. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college guide the student regarding different career avenues open to them in their respective fields through the notice board, organising training programmes and arranging lectures by experts and resource persons.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been set up in the college to ensure and enhance the quality of education and overall institutional performance, as mandated by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). Its main goal is to improve various aspects of the college, including academics, administration, and the learning environment, through continuous quality improvement initiatives.

Research and Development Cell

The R&D cell of the college acts as a vital academic incubator. It empowers both students and faculty by building a strong research culture, driving innovation, and securing external grants. Furthermore, it bridges the gap between theoretical learning and hands-on execution.

Women Grievance Redressal Cell

This cell has been formed to ensure the safety and protection of girl students, teaching and non-teaching women staff of the college against any form of sexual harassment and to make them aware of their legal and other rights. The Cell processes all the individual complaints and take immediate suitable action. The Cell will provide assistance to the Faculty/Colleges for taking preventive steps in the matter of gender discrimination and sexual harassment. The Cell also addresses other women-specific problems on a priority basis. The Cell form / review the guidelines / policy for redressal of the grievance as required from time to time, which may be in accordance with those issued by Supreme Court and Government Agencies.

Internal Complaints Committee

The Internal Complaints Committee of the college is established to address and resolve complaints of sexual harassment, ensuring a safe and conducive environment for students and staff. The ICC functions under the guidelines of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013, and the UGC Regulations, 2015.

Gender Sensitisation Cell

This cell has been constituted to achieve the objective of gender equality. Gender disparity manifests itself in various forms, and underlying causes of discrimination are related to social and economic structure, which is based on formal and informal norms and practices. The cell aims to ensure an equitable learning environment for the students and to create awareness of this issue by organising sessions and lectures.

SC/ST/OBC Cell

The cell works towards the sensitisation of the students towards the marginalised and underprivileged sections of the society in an effort to establish social harmony amongst them. The teachers put in special efforts to help students tide over their weaknesses to achieve academic excellence.

Disaster Management Cell

This cell, with the support of police personnel and home guards, makes sincere efforts to train and produce a team of young, alert and informed enthusiasts who will be able to work with phenomenal speed without losing equanimity of mind in the event of any natural or man-made disaster.

Educational Tours and Excursions Committee

Various educational tours, excursions and picnics are permitted during the academic session as experiential learning. However, for student safety certain conditions are required:

1. Every educational tour and excursion requires prior administrative approval, and a teacher must accompany the group at all times to manage safety, logistics, and discipline.
2. A student must possess a written consent from the parent before going on any educational tour, excursion or picnic.

Anti-Ragging Cell

All students are hereby cautioned that ragging is a criminal offence. An Anti-Ragging Cell, with the Principal as the Chairman, has been formed to sensitise the students about the menace of ragging which has sullied the names of many reputed institutions. The following

measures have been undertaken by the institution to ensure a safe environment for the new entrants:

1. Installation of CCTV cameras at vital points in the college.
2. Making students aware of the consequences of indulging in any form of ragging through notice boards.
3. Regular counselling of students by the members of the Anti-Ragging Cell.
4. The students also are required to give an undertaking at the time of admission that they are aware of the rules and regulations regarding ragging and are also aware of the consequences and shall not indulge in any form of ragging, which is an offence punishable under law.

All the students admitted to the college shall be deemed to have given the following undertaking:

“I have gone through the rules and regulations regarding ragging and discipline of the university/ college, and I hereby solemnly affirm that I will not indulge in any act of ragging/indiscipline and that if I am found guilty of such offences as are covered under these rules, I will have no claim against the order of rustication/expulsion from the college.”

Anti-Drugs Cell

Anti-Drug Cell of the college enforces a zero-tolerance policy against substance abuse, fully aligned with UGC Guidelines. It ensures a safe, drug-free campus by prohibiting the possession, consumption, or sale of alcohol and illicit substances. The cell actively protects students through awareness campaigns, expert counselling sessions, and peer-monitoring programmes.

College Magazine

The College brings out the yearly issue of its magazine titled ‘Abhay Jyoti’. The students having a flair for writing may submit their articles within the specified date for inclusion in the magazine.

Annual Prize Distribution

Prizes are awarded during the Annual Distribution Function for obtaining first, second and third positions in the aggregate and also for achieving first and second positions in the individual subjects in the Annual Examination, provided a student has passed in all the subjects offered. Apart from academic prizes, outstanding performers in sports, NCC, NSS, Rovers and Rangers and cultural activities are also felicitated.

Notice Board

All the students must read the notices which are pasted on the College Notice Board or displayed on one-notice board on a regular basis to keep acquainted with the latest developments in the college.

STUDENTS CHARTER

The students are important stakeholders in any educational institution. The Students' Charter as adopted by IQAC of the college is a document that defines and confers rights, responsibilities and privileges to the students with a view to achieve holistic growth.

- To inculcate amongst the students the values of social responsibility, religious and cultural tolerance and other values of human and national importance as per the Constitution of India and the vision document of the University Grants Commission.
- To adopt a student-centric approach in teaching-learning methodology.
- To develop the competence of the students at different levels, especially with regard to:
 - a) Linguistic competence
 - b) logical and analytical ability
 - c) Scientific temperament and
 - d) entrepreneurship.
- To provide support and guidance to the students through continuous mentoring, viz., regular tutorials, remedial courses and career counselling.
- To provide add-on, state-of-the-art courses and skill-orientated courses to enable the students to face the challenges of the future, like a) enhancing the soft skills and b) starting new courses in the fields of journalism, multimedia, advertising, floriculture, silviculture, horticulture, vermicomposting, greenhouse technology and rainwater harvesting/environmental conservation.
- To provide the students adequate exposure to the teaching-learning methodology through smart classrooms, IT and language labs.
- To receive constant feedback from the students and other stakeholders, like the Parent-Teacher Association and the Old Students' Association, for improving and strengthening the activities of the institution and to act upon the same in an empathic and pragmatic manner.

Responsibilities of the Students towards the Institution

All students of the college are expected to observe the following in the larger interest of the institution:

- To understand, appreciate and follow the vision and goals of the institution.
- To have a clear and adequate knowledge of various programmes of study, admission policy, programme completion requirements, assessment mechanisms and other student services of the college.
- To undertake regular and intense study of their course material.
- To adhere to the general norms of the institution with regard to the courses of study time and schedule as per ordinances/rules/acts of H.P. Government or H.P. University/UGC as framed and implemented from time to time.
- To abide by the decision of the college administration in case of any grievance, individual or pertaining to more than one student/group, and to help the college administration.
- To make optimum use of learning resources available in the college and to participate actively in academically enriching programmes such as seminars, workshops, debates, etc.
- To provide neutral feedback on the quality of teaching and various other activities undertaken by the college, both in a formal and informal way, whenever they are asked for the same.
- To contribute to the enrichment of the institutional life of the college through their engagement in all the student-related activities of the institution as outlined in Part A of the Students' Charter.
- Not to indulge in acts of ragging or to make use of any kind of intoxicants in and around the institution.
- Not to shout slogans, damage college property, deface walls or desks, spit or spread litter on the campus, or indulge in other acts of violence which tend to disrupt the academic and general atmosphere of the college and amount to unlawful or criminal acts.
- To follow the moral and constitutional values as enshrined in our multidimensional culture, the Constitution of India, including respect for diversity of ideas/thinking and inculcation of an inclusive culture without any preconceived notions of caste, creed or religion.

Discipline and Conduct

The principal and the members of the teaching staff have the power to take disciplinary action against students indulging in reprehensible acts, which may lead to the imposition of a fine, suspension or expulsion from the college. The following conduct comes within the purview of indiscipline and misconduct:

- Ragging in or around the college campus.
- Use of drugs in the college premises or even in the vicinity of the college.
- Damage to college property that includes defacement of walls and blackboards and damage to furniture (breaking window panes, plucking flowers, removing notices, tampering with electrical/water fittings, etc.) is also a breach of discipline.

- Loitering around in the campus or corridors during vacant periods, causing disturbance to teaching work.
- Putting up of notices on the College Notice Board without proper authorisation by the college authorities.
- Smoking, chewing of tobacco/gutka, using of cell phones and plying of vehicles within the college premises is strictly prohibited and any infringement may entail a fine of Rs.100/-
- The use of mobile phones are banned in classrooms and campus grounds. Students may only use them in a specific zone designated by the college.
- Writing on the walls and sticking posters or pamphlets in the college campus.
- Wearing party-based badges in classrooms, the principal's office, or the staff room.

Note: The entire campus of the college is under surveillance of the CCTV cameras.

RAGGING: A CRIMINAL OFFENCE

Rajiv Gandhi Government College, Chaura Maidan, Shimla, maintains a strict **zero-tolerance policy** towards ragging. The campus is a completely ragging-free zone, and any student found indulging in, abetting, or actively participating in ragging activities – directly or indirectly – will face severe disciplinary and legal action without exception.

As per Section 2(c) of the Himachal Pradesh Educational Institutions (Prohibition of Ragging) Act, 2009, ragging is defined as:

"...any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power of senior students, former students or outsiders, is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior by other students and includes individual or collective acts or practices which

- (i) involve physical or psychological assault or threat or use of force or wrongful confinement or restraint; or
- (ii) violate the status, dignity and honour of such students; or
- (iii) expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem; or
- (iv) entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour."

Ragging is a cognisable and non-bailable criminal offence. Under Section 3 and Section 7 of the Act, students found guilty will face the following strict legal ramifications:

- **Imprisonment & Fine:** Any person who contravenes the provisions of the Act shall, on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or with a fine which may extend to ₹50,000, or both.
- **Immediate Expulsion:** Any student convicted of an offence under this Act shall be expelled from the educational institution immediately.
- **Academic Blacklisting:** A student expelled from an institution on account of ragging shall not be admitted into any other educational institution for a period of three years from the date of such expulsion.
